

Her mother married liam Huntington who died shortly after they left Nauvoo were residing in Mount Pisgah. The family stayed there almost a year before moving on to Council Bluffs. Upon thing the valley Lydia lived with her mother in Salt Lake. But four years later she married Amasa M. Lyman as his wife. He had previously married two of Lydia's sisters, a and Caroline.

Lydia's husband moved his families to Fillmore, Utah. felt that if he could establish his families there, he could er educate and care for them. Because the families were trge, each wife helped as best she could to provide for herand her family. Lydia was a good seamstress and did h sewing. She was an expert in working with buck skin, ing moccasins and gloves which she sold.

The Partridge sisters were always close to each other and mother continued to live with them.

Lydia was in poor health most of her life. When she was only forty-four years of age she took sick, in such pain that she could not be touched and had to be moved on a sheet. She was tenderly cared for by her son Edward who was eighteen and her daughter Ida Evelyn, who was sixteen and her sisters Caroline and Eliza. After sixteen weeks of painful illness, Lydia passed away. She was the only one of Amasa M. Lyman's eight wives to be buried by his side.

Little Maria, a delicate, blue eyed, golden haired girl was left motherless at the age of six years and was reared by her step mother Elizabeth. In the year 1834, two years after she had been baptized two young missionaries Elders Tippets and Lyman came to the Tanner's beautiful spacious home for the evening meal. As they sat down Maria came in when requested by her father to do so. She was described as having blond hair, prominent nose, eyes aglow with feeling, and a blush that amplified her beauty. Amasa at that very moment was emotionally upset and all during the five days that they were there Amasa was thinking of the future he wanted with Maria.

The Tanner family sold all their vast properties in New York and went to Kirtland which was a blessing to the Church as his money lifted the mortgage off the farm the temple was being built on. When Amasa arrived in Kirtland he could no longer resist Maria's charms and eleven days later 10 June 1935 they were married. Conditions were worsening in Kirtland and they moved to Caldwell, Missouri. Here there was trouble with the mobs and days of suspense and terror for Maria whose husband had been arrested by the jeering mob. After much trouble, hardships and many moves, and her husband accepting the law of plural marriage, plans were made to go west. On 16 April 1847 Amasa and his seven wives and children started on the long journey to the land of promise in

the tops of the mountains. They located at Little Cottonwood, Utah. It was here that she and her children lived while her husband filled a mission to California. In 1851 she and her family and all but two wives started for California and they settled San Bernardino. Here she was not only mother to her own family but also mother to the three orphaned Flake children who were taken into her home and raised as her own. After seven years the coming of Johnston's Army to Salt Lake City made it necessary for them to return to the main body of the church. She lived in various cities but finally in 1863 they settled in their new home at Fillmore. In her home there was always something laid away for a rainy day. There was something to give to the needy and deserving, something ready for an emergency.

Her husband served twenty-five years and month as an Apostle of the church and her son Francis Marion served for 25 years and 6 months. She lived twenty-eight years as a widow, retaining all her faculties and spent the latter part of her life with some of her children in Salt Lake City where she died at the age of eighty-seven.

When Paulina was four years old, her parents joined the Church. When she was young she was blessed by Parley P. Pratt, in a dungeon in Richmond, Missouri, and later promised in a blessing given by the Prophet Joseph Smith that she would go to the Rocky Mountains.

Paulina's mother rode 150 miles to help her husband escape from a prison in Missouri, along with his inmates, Parley P. Pratt and King Follett. It was necessary for Paulina to help raise her younger brothers and sisters when her mother died a year or two later. At the time Paulina was fourteen years old and being the oldest the responsibility was heavy.

She became Apostle Amasa Lyman's plural wife when she was nineteen, marrying him in the Nauvoo Temple. Their first child, a son, was born at Winter Quarters. While there she was nurse to the sick and left that setttlement to drive a wagon, by herself, across the plains.

Paulina lived in Salt Lake City for a few years and then was sent by President Brigham Young to the first southern Utah settlement, of Parowan, to be a nurse and midwife to that community. For over 50 years she kept meticulous records of the 500 plus births she assisted. Paulina was one of the first to use disinfectants and also set broken bones and stitched up wounds. She vaccinated the whole community for smallpox.

During her life she raised seven children and finished raising two children of her husband and his wife Cornelia, after Cornelia's death.

Paulina was skilled in weaving and tailoring. She made 130 suits for men and boys during the first four years she was in Parowan. She did beautiful handwork and many of her pieces are in the Old Rock Church Museum in Parowan. Her bedspreads are in museums in Salt Lake City and in New York. She bought a loom and wove carpets, jeans etc.

When Paulina was 65 years old, she went to Salt Lake City to take a course offered by Dr. Ellis Reynolds Shipp on obstetrics and passed it with honors. On going back to Parowan, she taught a class on obstetrics to others in her community, including her daughter, Laura Lyman Clark and her daughter-in-law Barbara Ward Lyman.

Paulina Lyman died at her home in Parowan at the age of 85 and has left an imprint on the lives of its citizens and the mention of her name brings sweet and appreciative statements to this day.

Jakeman, Daughters of the Utah Pioneers and Their Mothers, p. 102 Louisa Maria Tanner Lyman: - Daughter of John, and Lydia, (Stewart) Tanner, born November 28, 1818, at Bolton, Warren County, New York. A delicate, blue-eyed, lighthaired girl. Baptized and confirmed in the Mormon Church, December 25, 1832, by Orson Pratt, in Lake George. An orphan at 6 years and 6 months. In winter of 1833 and 1834 with family moved to Kirtland, Ohio, where on June 10, 1835, she married Amasa M. Lyman. She shared the history and fate of the Church in Ohio, Missouri, Illinois and in the pioneer movements to Utah in those early days of hardship and poverty, uncomplainingly. Was a pioneer also to San Bernardino, California, 1851, returning to Utah in 1858, locating in Cedar, Beaver, Fillmore, Tooele and Salt Lake City. She had eight children and raised six orphans. In 1887 Mrs. Lyman, for 68 days, was visiting the waste places of Zion in the east and spent six weeks with her sister, Mrs. Matilda Randall, from whom she had been separated over fifty years. She made this journey when she was 69 years of age, being, her last great journey, in company with her elder son. The latter years of her life she lived with her son, Francis M. Lyman, and daughter, Mrs. L. Josephine Coombs, during her 29 years of widowhood in Tooele and Salt Lake City, where she died May 3, 1906, at the ripe age of 87 years and 6 months. At that time her posterity numbered 214. Her children, six girls and two boys, were Matilda, Francis Marion, Ruth Adelia, Amasa Mason, Maria Louisa, Lelia Deseret, Love Josephine and Agnes Hila. Five of her girls preceded her in death. She lived and died a loving, constant wife and mother. A true woman and a devout Latter-day Saint. She endured patiently the hardships of pioneer and frontier life in poverty all her days. She was a renowned economist, hopeful and resourceful and never discouraged. Her charity and womanly virtues never failed. She died without sickness and it was difficult to tell when her spirit took its departure. Mrs. Lyman was an intimate acquaintance of the Prophet Joseph Smith and his Patriarch Brother Hyrum and the family and all of the early leaders of the church.

upon her. From their temporary quarters in Kirtland, they moved with many of their co-religionists to Missouri in 1838 and went through the fury of Governor Bogg's infamous exterminating orders. During this notorious outrage, Amasa, along with Joseph Smith and others, was sentenced to be shot at sunrise, but instead, they were chained together and confined in a filthy dungeon while the mad mob went on with the governor's stern orders.

When the Lymans escaped to Illinois with their little family, Maria still carried on bravely through the privations she had to meet as the wife of one of the church leaders, for Amasa had been called to stand very near to the Prophet, to share in the tide of fury directed against him by his enemies, and he found it quite impossible to use much of his time for his own comfort. He had therefore not been able to make a home for his family when the prophet was martyred in June, 1844, and soon thereafter he joined in their search for a home in the distant west. Being one of the Quorum of Apostles, Amasa accompanied Brigham Young and his pioneers on their initial trip to the Rocky Mountains, and Maria went through a year and a half of homelessness and great hardships before she came into the shelter of a rude log cabin in Salt Lake City. With this prospect of a resting place, she and her children did what they could to make a home while the husband and father filled a mission to California.

On his return from his California mission in 1851, Amasa Lyman was called with his fellow-apostle, Charles C. Rich, to found a colony near the Pacific Coast, and the little family took up their march again with him towards the west, crossing a perilous desert in a journey lasting nearly three months. In the midst of tremendous difficulties they began what became San Bernardino. At the end of seven years they had built there, by great toil and effort, their nearest approach so far to a home, but the coming of Johnston's Army to Salt Lake City made it necessary for them to return to the main body of their people, and they crossed back over the desert to the east to make another beginning.

They stopped in Farmington and later found shelter in Salt Lake City, but the making of another permanent place had to wait while Amasa went as one of the Twelve to preside over the European Mission in which position, with headquarters at Liverpool, he visited all the British Isles and most of the countries of the continent, in a period covering somewhat more than two years.

Still hopeful of having a comfortable abiding place, the Lymans began in 1863 to make a home in Fillmore. After fourteen years of delays and misfortunes this hope of a home was beginning to be realized when Amasa Lyman died, in February, 1877.

Maria Tanner Lyman, though spare built and frail in appearance, had a cheery disposition and a great tenacity of life. Besides caring for her own eight children she mothered three orphans, and was never content when not ministering to the comfort of some of

her loved ones. Her long schooling in adversity made her an expert economist; she could find ways to live and prosper in poverty and privation. She lived twenty-eight years as a widow, retaining all her faculties, and spent the latter part of her life with some of her children in Salt Lake City where she died May 3, 1906, at the ripe age of eighty-seven.

ALBERT MILES TANNER was the youngest son of John Tanner by his second wife, Lydia Stuart. His mother died during his infancy and he was mothered by the third wife of John Tanner whom he loved as a mother. Albert was born at Bolton, Warren County, New York, on the shores of the beautiful Lake George on the 4th of April, 1825. He emigrated from his native town in 1846 with his father. Later he, with his brother Myron enlisted in the Mormon Battalion and came to California as a soldier. After he was mustered out of service he went to San Bernardino where he engaged in farming and team work.

In 1848 Albert was drawn by the gold excitement to the Sacramento and Feather rivers. He was engaged in the mines and teaming on Mormon Island until late in 1850. Thereafter he returned to San Bernardino where he resumed his farming and stock raising. He was married September 9th, 1855, to Lovina Bickmore, daughter of William and Christina Bickmore. They had eight children.
